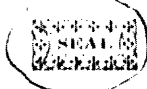

Survey executed with a W. and L.E. Gurley transit No.37. 2 verniers to limb, and in perfect adjustment. In order to locate Island I go to the meander between Sections 25 and 36, find the bearing trees for meander standing in 2 feet of water, caused by flowage of dam in section 10, T. 39 N., R. 5 E. I set meander Post, according to Deputy U. S. Surveyor's field notes, which stands in $4\frac{1}{2}$ feet of water.

I then go to $\frac{1}{4}$ Post ^{on} line between Sections 25 and 36, and set new Post from bearing trees given in Deputy U. S. Surveyor's field notes.

I then place instrument on line between meanders and $\frac{1}{4}$ Post and 5.00 chains West of Meander Post, prolonged the direction N.86°E. between Sections 25 and 36, and set flag at high water-mark on N.W.side of island.

To determine the distance from meander to flag on island, I find it impossible to lay off a base line on account of flowage, which covers nearly all the land 5.00 chs. west of meander. My instrument being supplied with Stadia wires in telescope I carefully test same by actual measurements, and proceed to take distance, which I find to be 21.79 chs. from instrument to flag, leaves distance from meander to flag 16.79 chs.

In place of flag I set a Hemlock Post 4x4 ins. $3\frac{1}{2}$ feet high 1 foot in ground, no. 3500.

set on bank 6 feet high a Hemlock post 4x4 ins 3½ feet long, 1 foot in ground, marked M C for Meander Corner, from which a White Birch, 8 ins. in dia. bears N 79° W. 7½ links, marked T 39 N R 6 E S 25 M C B T. A White Birch 11 ins. in dia. bears S.6° W. 10½ links, marked T 39 N R 6 E S 36 M C B T. I then begin to meander island from meander on NW shore of island.

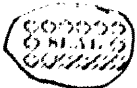
